In recent years, scholars from different fields have begun to conduct serious academic work on the software industry, especially Open Source Software. We believe that it is time to take stock of the work that has been done, to assess what we have learned, and to refocus the research agenda for the next few years. The aim of this high-level academic conference, entirely dedicated to open source software, is to facilitate this process. In order to do so, it will bring together academics (mainly economists, lawyers, and business school faculty) practitioners (programmers and managers involved in open source and commercial software), and policymakers. The general idea is to have a relaxed, discussion-friendly and nonpartisan atmosphere on themes such as a) optimal licensing policy for open source software, b) the patentability of software, and c) emerging mixed business models with an open source-commercial interface. There will be both academic-style presentations and panel discussions.
